more, where he was in his junior year in an engineering course. He was graduated from Chester High School with honors in January, 1937, being only 16 years old at that time. He was presented with the high school faculty award and a prize for his excellent work on the school publications, and received third prize in the competition for the Kiwanis award.

Born June 18, 1920, he was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Cosinuke, native Russians who came to America in 1913. They have a small grocery store at the Wilson street address and have another son, Walter, 17, a junior in the industrial course at the high school.

The youth, who was also on the Swarthmore football squad, was stricken in the Kappa Alpha Fraternity house on the Washington and Lee campus, where he had gone with friends earlier in the night.

He was alone at the time, having gone to a room to pack his clothing and move to another fraternity house to spend the night. The team, in addition to defeating the W. and L. ten, had routed the University of Virginia 10-1 on Thursday. Swarthmore had lost only one game all season, being defeated by Dartmouth, 5-4 in the overtime opening contest.

Cosinuke was attending the college on a working scholarship which he received for his fine record at Chester High, commuting daily from his home in this city. He did not earn his lacrosse letter last year, although he was on the squad, but showed considerable improvement this season and gained a regular berth. In the game in which Swarthmore defeated Williams, 10-3, he scored two goals.

In addition to being on the college team, Cosinuke played with the Chester Comets box lacrosse club.

Avery Blake, coach of the Swarthmore outfit, remained at Lexington in order to accompany the body to Chester last night. The other players returned yesterday morning, shocked by the tragedy.
