

### INDIANS AT BOX LACROSSE TODAY

#### Swarthmore Sextet Meets Philadelphia Comets on Local Field

Starting today, the Swarthmore Indians will create that resilient little pole known as a lacrosse ball—every Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, instead of the usual 6:30 p. m. in Wednesday affairs. The weekly engagements will keep up probably until the end of November, weather permitting.

The setup today will be with the Philadelphia Comets, out of the Fairview and Chester roads box, both teams lining up with college coaches, ex-college stars, and fast local stick-wielders on the field.

The attendance at these Swarthmore box-lacrosse games has been not the least interesting part of the whole show. Drawing many of the best players from Swarthmore, Philadelphia from Chester, Media, Morton, and the Chester area, the Indians surprisingly find their strongest equipment social ladies of the borough, who appear to like the rough and tumble blood-sport best of all.

Porter Wolfe, who made a name for himself in the ice hockey circles and developed the Hershey stars, is responsible in a large measure for the development of the box lacrosse which has moved to be so popular among the elite here.

The Indians will have Tim White, hair at goal; Ray Fellows, former Penn State star, on one defense position; Avery Blake, captain, and other defense; Bud Green, another State man, in the center position; and Johnny and Percy Bellard as attackers. Johnny was the captain of the State team a few years back, and Percy, also from Penn State, has charge of the kids team, which handles the sticks every Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.

For spurs, the Indians will have Porter Wolfe, Bud and Bill Hickman, both from State; Joe Malzy, who was developed by Wolfe at Hershey and who took the European tour with the American lacrosse team a season ago; Whitey Joyce, of Swarthmore Col. High; Cliff Ramsey, a home town boy; and Ivy Kahler, another local.

They will be stacked up against the Tom Stroblar, the fifty-year-old grand-dad of lacrosse in America, who still is one of the best ponies in the county, being a former captain of the creek Hopkins team of twenty-five or so years ago; and Bud Zimmerman, a Penn State man who plays a defense position opposite Zebnow, Temple football star, who has turned to lacrosse.

Besides the center, Bob, the top Comet attack man, are Nate and Edna Javianski. The first spare is So Whitey Howard. Both Howard and Edna "hoop ends" of the '22 Swarthmore football team. Chink Richards, a Philadelphia Park man, and Vito Townsend, former Syracuse captain and European player, are two other spares.

Coming next week are the Mount Pleasant team and the Mount Washington team, the latter being Bobby Pool's sensational club from Baltimore. Pool, the St. Johns College coach, has been in the news for having gathered here three years ago, has gathered together the pick of the lacrosse men from the big three in Maryland—Johns Hopkins, University of Maryland and St. Johns, and is next two weeks to take on the Indians.
