

McCLOSKEY ON ALL-AMERICAN LACROSSE TEAM

Harry McCloskey, Swarthmore College three letter athlete from S. Williamsport was named on the All-America Lacrosse team for 1945, as announced by the U. S. Inter-Collegiate Lacrosse Association.

McCloskey, a Navy V-12 trainee, entered Swarthmore with the first unit of this group in July, 1943, as a transfer from Muhlenburg and played full-back on the football team for two seasons, one year of basketball and two seasons of lacrosse. He received his B. S. with the June graduating class and is now attending in shipman's school at Columbia. This year's lacrosse captain, as well as football, he played first attack and was high scorer with a total of 33 goals for the season, scoring in every game but the first against R. P. I. Harry had never seen a stick, nor a contest of the old Indian game before entering Swarthmore, which makes the accomplishment of his selection all the more outstanding. He was a constant threat to the opposing defense, for he was a capable "feeder" as well as dodger and accounted for many assists in addition to his goals.

Coach "Ave" Blake stated: "Mac was a fine stick handler, an excellent dodger and one of the greatest competitors it had ever been my pleasure to handle. He well deserved this final honor that has come his way, we will sure miss him here."

"Ed" Bradbury, heavyweight wrestler and football guard along with "Abner" Albertson, who also played soccer, were named to the squad and given honorable mention. "Ed" at close defense and "Ab" in the midfield.

McCloskey is the first "first team selection" since Fred Donneley in 1940-41.
